SHORECREST FOR THE FUTURE: A CAMPAIGN FOR CONTINUED EXCELLENCE

1986-1987

Shorecrest for the Future was a six-month long campaign with the primary focus on new and replacement classrooms. During this campaign, the School built new Maintenance and Central Administrations buildings, Jr. Kindergarten classrooms, Middle School classrooms and offices, Upper School classrooms, and outdoor teaching stations.

Total Funds Raised: \$1.2M

SHORECREST BUILDS

1997-2006

Shorecrest Builds encompassed multiple capital projects to complete the new campus on First Street Northeast. During this campaign, the following projects were completed:

- The Sher and Razook Fifth & Sixth Grade Center was built.
- Renovations to existing athletic fields were completed in addition to a few new fields.
- The Raymund Arts & Media Center was built in 2002, which included the Carleen Vinal Haskell Library, David & Pam Murphy Student Activity Center, the Janet Root Theatre and the Fine Arts Gallery.
- The Morean Manning Lower School building began construction in 2003, and was completed in May of 2004.

Dollars raised for these projects were co-mingled with annual fund revenue and, as time went on, pledges that were continuing to be paid down were distributed for future capital projects.

Total Funds Raised: \$8.9M

LEADING TODAY, BUILDING TOMORROW

2006-2009

The community's next priority was the completion of a new Upper School building and a new seventh and eighth grade Center. The Upper School facility consists of approximately 25,000 sq. feet with two stories, designed to house classrooms for English, history, math, art, world languages and photography, as well as administrative offices, a College Counseling Center and more. The facility was named Landy Hall due to a lead gift of \$1,500,000 by an anonymous donor. The seventh and eighth grade Center - now the Middle School Arts and Sciences Center - is a two-story building that was built to complement the Sher and Razook Fifth and Sixth Grade Center. It houses classrooms, offices, computer labs, The Innovation and Design Studio, specialty spaces for music and drama, a conference room, and Learning Center. The groundbreaking ceremony for these new facilities took place on May 16, 2007, and construction was completed during the 2008-09 academic year. Funds from this project were intended to be used for capital expenditures, ongoing maintenance and repairs of other campus buildings and endowment funds. Total Funds Raised: \$7.2M

ATHLETIC CENTER CAMPAIGN

2010-2012

With the completion of the academic programming buildings around the campus, the community's next priority was to foster Charger pride and drive enrollment by updating Athletic Facilities and replacing the original Crisp Gymnasium built in 1972. The Expect the Best... Beyond the Game Campaign (often referred to as simply the Athletic Center Campaign) was planned to be a space that would complement the Janet Root Theatre as a space that would strengthen community spirit and offer an extension of the great academic programming at Shorecrest.

- The first floor of the Athletic Center would serve the most current needs of the school by including a new main gymnasium, recreational gym, locker rooms, ticket booth, concessions stand, workout facility, and athletic administrative offices.
- The second floor would launch Shorecrest into the future and make the Athletic Center the most flexible facility on campus. It would
 strengthen Shorecrest's focus on health and wellness for all students by ensuring dedicated spaces specific to their activities. It
 would feature more than 7,500 sq. feet of specialized areas for cardio fitness, dance and cheerleading as well as wrestling a new
 sport in the 2011-2012 school year. There would also be adjustable seminar and classroom spaces that could be used for sports
 science and health classes as well as faculty and athletics meetings. Teams could use the second floor areas to hold team meetings
 and improve play through the review and study of game film.

The first phase of the campaign to complete the first floor and renovate the existing Haskell Field and Hernandez Family Baseball Field was a success. However, the second phase to create the second floor of the Athletic Center was never completed. The second floor houses a shell space where construction could begin in the future to provide an additional 7,500 sq. feet of program space. Total Funds Raised: \$5.2M

TRANSFORM CAMPAIGN

March 2017-July 2021

Transform was the final puzzle piece to complete the Shorecrest campus, creating more than 60,000 square feet of new facilities and reimagining the lower campus to align with Shorecrest's Vision & Strategic Plan.

Shorecrest publicly announced the Transform Campaign in March 2018. Over two-and-half years, the community experienced many milestone events — from our "30 for 30" event, to a community-wide Rise event celebrating the opening of the first floor of Charger Commons in 2019, to eating in our first ever Dining Rooms, to the 2021-2022 school year starting with classrooms, offices, a library and more available on the second floor of Charger Commons. The completion of this campaign marked a pivotal moment for Shorecrest, bringing the school closer to completing its campus master plan with facilities that match the quality of teaching and learning for which Shorecrest is known.
